CONSTRUCTION FOR REDESIGNED MARCEY PARK TO BEGIN 4Q 2020

noted As in our recent report to drca@yahoogroups.com, the County staff have been soliciting neighborhood input on the redesign of the facilities at Marcey Park. Construction is now scheduled to begin sometime in the fourth quarter of 2020, with completion expected in the second quarter of next year. At a December meeting, as previously reported, we received an update on the proposed design, the highlights of which are as follows:

1. The principal goal is to create a more permanent solution for the groundwater below the tennis and basketball courts, so as to avoid the cracks and sloping on the courts and the need for frequent resurfacing.

2. This will include a stormwater catchment behind the tennis courts and the planting of trees down the sledding hill. We discussed the possibility of placing the new trees so as not to preclude sledding (much as was done on the steeper sledding hill closer to the Nature Center).

3. The County has determined not to include a pickleball court at this time, based on concerns about competing uses of limited facilities, and pending the results of a pilot project for such shared use at Walter Reed. Pickleball advocates note possible plans for a pickleball court at Madison.

4. The County plans to take steps to preserve the large silver maple next to the tennis courts. In response to previous concerns, it has now agreed not to remove the large Norway fir down by the basketball court. However, the County arborist says the large silver maple next to this Norway fir is decaying and needs removal. Since our December meeting, we have shared with him a report from a certified arborist recommending that this analysis be confirmed by taking samples from the top of the tree. We also have emphasized the County's policy to preserve the diminishing tree canopy on its own property. We are currently awaiting a further response on this question.

5. The new design will include a path that affords disability access to the basketball court.

26th STREET-OLD DOMINION TASK FORCE REPORT DISCUSSED WITH COUNTY BOARD IN DECEMBER Anne Wilson

On December 10, the recommendations of the 26th Street-Old Dominion Task Force was a major focus of a county board work session. The Task Force report was submitted to the Board in April, and this was the first public discussion of it. Noah Simon, the chairman of the Task Force, walked the Board through the process and recommendations. He emphasized the Task Force's conclusion that additional data should be collected around the historic use of the existing salt facility to evaluate the need for constructing a major snow removal facility on the north side of the County. One item that Noah suggested could be addressed in the short term is the recommendation that the green space at the trailhead park entrance be enhanced. The Task Force had recommended that this area be upgraded to include a walking path throughout the area, open green space, casual use seating, and a natural-style play area.

The County Board Chair at the time of the meeting, Christian Dorsey, said that the purpose of the work session was not to endorse the report, but rather to understand it. He indicated that before any major decisions were made about the site, there would be additional community meetings, and that some items could be included in the Capital Improvement Plan that is due out later this year. DRCA will be actively pursuing the recommended improvements to the trailhead area in the coming months. DRCA PARTICIPATION AS ARLINGTON CENSUS PARTNER Bill Richardson

DRCA has joined almost 200 other civic organizations and businesses to help Arlington County ensure your prompt participation in Census 2020. These participants include 17 civic associations, as well as Dorothy Hamm Middle School, Yorktown High School, and Cherrydale Library.

The U.S. Constitution requires the conduct of the census every ten years; the first census was taken in 1790. An accurate census is critical for the establishment of federal and state legislative district boundaries, the reapportionment of the House of Representatives according to population, the development of reliable data for planning, and the distribution of over \$675 billion annually in federal funds. Arlington County, for example, receives over \$50 million each year based on census data, principally for housing, Medicaid, school lunch, and highway programs.

Sometime in mid-March, you should receive an invitation by mail from the U.S. Census Bureau asking you to answer a very short set of questions as to those living or staying at your home as of April 1, 2020. For the first time, you may complete the form online, or you may respond as in the past by mail or by phone. Participation is required by federal law. Arlington Census Partners encourage you to respond promptly in order to avoid the costs of follow-up reminders and the need for enumerators to contact you personally to complete the form.

Federal law requires protection of the confidentiality of your responses to the questions on the census form. The questions are very simple:

- How many people are living or staying at your home?
- Is your home owned or rented?
- What is the sex, age, and race of each such person?
- How many such persons are of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin?
- What is the relationship of such persons?

Be aware that the U.S. Census Bureau will never ask you for your social security number, for information on behalf of any political party, or for money or bank or credit card information. If you receive any such purported requests, the Bureau advises not to respond to them. If you have any questions about such potential scams, you may contact your local Census Bureau representative

PLAN LEE HIGHWAY KICKS OFF 2020 WITH FEBRUARY 1 COMMUNITY WORKSHOP Bill Richardson

As we have noted in prior newsletters, Plan Lee Highway is a project aimed at establishing the first comprehensive plan for Lee Highway, designed to direct future growth and investment toward community goals. It will be continuing to look over the next couple of years at nine key factors in the Lee Highway corridor: land use, urban design and building form, housing, transportation, public spaces, historic and cultural resources, economic vitality, sustainability, and schools/community facilities/social hubs. In December 2019, the project completed its Existing Conditions Analysis Report, which is available at https://arlingtonva.s3.amazonaws.com/wpcontent/uploads/sites/31/2019/11/191101_ECR_ FINAL_reducedsize.pdf

The next major Plan Lee Highway event will be a Community Workshop, to be held on **Saturday**, **February 1, 2020**, at Washington-Liberty High School, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (A shorter session also will be available at Washington-Liberty the night before, from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m.) This workshop will provide another opportunity to learn about progress and information uncovered so far and share your own ideas.

You may also drop by the Lee Highway Alliance office, at 4620 Lee Highway, to view the latest information, meet with project planners, ask questions, and share ideas. These Plan Lee Highway Design Studio events are held every other Friday, from 12:00 to 3:30 p.m., on a drop by basis. The next such event will be on **Friday**, **February 14, 2020**.
