The Donaldson Run Civic Association (DRCA) kicks off the new school year with two events this month. See below and the article on page 2 for more details.

On **Saturday**, **August 31**, we will be having our third annual Labor Day ice cream social at Taylor School, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Please come and learn more about who DRCA is and what we do, with a chance to meet your neighbors and their families.

On **Wednesday, September 18**, we will have our next meeting, also at Taylor School, beginning with a social half hour at 7:00 p.m. Our guest speakers will be Bill Browning from Arlington Regional Master Naturalists and Jennifer Toussaint, Chief Animal Control Officer of the Animal Welfare League of Arlington who will discuss the County's recommendation to address the deer population problem primarily with controlled sharpshooting, We also invited County staff but they declined to attend. After this discussion, we will have an open forum to hear from you on any other issues of concern.

DRCA relies on this newsletter -- and our iO Groups e-mail list -- to let you know about developments with major impact on our neighborhood. We often hear that you are unaware of these developments -- including "missing middle" plans and development proposals, Plan Langston Boulevard plans for more intense

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development at the Lee Heights Shops, efforts to reform the generous lot coverage and height restrictions on residential construction, and various traffic and traffic circle issues. We encourage you to read these communications and inform us of your views as we relay our concerns to the County Board and staff.

With help from a recent \$500 grant from the County, we also hope to increase the frequency of those communications with you. One of our goals is to promote participation among a more diverse range of interests among our 948 households. We depend on you to help us achieve that goal. While we provide our newsletter to each of these households, we also depend upon

COUNTY MAKING PROGRESS ON DEER MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

DRCA is pleased to welcome to our September 18 meeting Bill Browning from Arlington Regional Master Naturalists (ARMN) as well as Jennifer Toussaint, Chief of Animal Control for the Animal Welfare League of Arlington (AWLA), for a discussion on deer management.

Continuing several years of consideration in the form of surveys, consultant studies, and public engagement, Arlington Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) is getting closer to implementing a deer management program. The County has determined that Arlington does not have enough predators for deer, so the deer population grows too quickly and upsets the balance of nature. This project aims to identify ways to protect Arlington's county-owned parks so that all the plants and animals that are a part of the County's ecosystem can live and thrive.

In February, a public engagement was held in which community members were invited to join the deer project team for two informational sessions. Project staff were joined by the contractor, White Buffalo Inc., to answer a variety of questions, both pre-submitted and those raised during the sessions. Videos of these sessions are available on the County's deer management page. In early June, the County then released its draft recommendations for deer management. These recommendations were informed by a detailed report from White Buffalo (https://www.arlingtonva.us/files/sharedassets/ public/v/1/parks-

recreation/documents/nature/arlington-co-finalreport-4-june-2024.pdf), which includes their recommendations as well as comprehensive research and community feedback from a public engagement in 2023.

The County's recommendation largely entails using "to reduce sharpshooters immediately deer populations by 100-125 deer in county-owned parks." Hunters would operate outside of park hours, using silencers and non-lead bullets. Also recommended is the use of fencing and repellants to protect priority plant spaces in small areas, as well as additional monitoring of deer populations and ongoing studies of deer's impact on parks. Another public engagement took place with an online feedback form, and a virtual community meeting was held on July 11 to answer questions from the community. A video of this meeting is available to view on the County's deer management page.

For many years, DRCA has voiced support for the County's consideration of implementing a deer management program. As far back as May 2021, we hosted deer management advocates from the Arlington Regional Master Naturalists (ARMN) at a neighborhood meeting that took place online due to the pandemic. DPR anticipates releasing a summary of the most recent engagement and next steps on the Deer Management Project before the end of the summer. Next steps, if appropriate, would include additional details on implementing a Deer Management Program. Should the County decide to proceed with a program that includes sharpshooting, the County Board will need to amend the County Code to permit this activity in county-owned parks. We will continue to follow closely the County's consideration of this program given its significant impact on our residents and their properties.

7-STORY SENIOR LIVING FACILITY PROPOSED ADJACENT TO LEBANESE TAVERNA IN LEE HEIGHTS

During the County's consideration of "Plan Langston Boulevard" (PLB), Donaldson Run Civic Association (DRCA) consistently urged that the current Lee Heights Shops environment not be transformed into a potential "canyonland" of highrise buildings. Notwithstanding DRCA's concerns, the County Board adopted recommendations favoring higher 7-story buildings on one side of the shops, and 10-story buildings on the other side. Such proposals will now be evaluated under the County's site review process, in light of community benefits to be specified in each case benefits that are required for exceeding the current "by right" limit of about four stories. Asserting that Lee Heights is the "heart" of the Langston Boulevard corridor, the County approved recommendations for higher structures there than at Lee Harrison Shopping Center (seven stories), or across from new Fire Station 8 in the Heidelberg bakery area (four stories), or in Cherrydale (not included at all in PLB).

In April 2024, Kensington Senior Living filed a very preliminary plan for County review, proposing a 7-story elder care facility (assisted living and memory care), between Lebanese Taverna and the 7-11 on Langston Boulevard. Kensington, which currently operates a similar facility in Falls Church, is owned by former Sunrise executives. Their plan calls for 130 units and 114 parking spaces.

In July, DRCA and two other adjacent civic associations met with Kensington to discuss their plan. There is considerable support for additional elder care facilities in our area, as recognized by the County. This is particularly true in light of the demise of a similar proposal by another group that would have been located between Cherrydale and Waverly Hills on a different site on Cherry Hill Road, between Lee Heights and the five points intersection at Quincy Street and Military Road.

At our meeting, DRCA raised a number of issues with Kensington, which we plan to follow up on:

• Ensuring that their traffic study required by the County addresses the parking and traffic issues associated with such a large facility in this restricted space. These would include how they plan to use Upton Street as a back alley for loading without disrupting traffic on Langston Boulevard or continued access to Lee Heights, and possible substantial traffic for families visiting residents.

- Meeting the PLB recommendation for extensive tree canopy – 35 percent of the area for all sites of seven stories or more, and 20 percent for sites under seven stories.
- Meeting the PLB recommendations for setbacks, and also for step-backs for buildings across the street from singlefamily homes.
- Understanding the size and nature of the "civic and community amenity space" promised for the first floor of the building.
- Addressing how this proposal may or may not fit with future PLB developments affecting the Lee Heights Shops.
- Ascertaining what financial or other commitments Kensington will make for "help[ing] the County achieve its affordable housing goals," given that this facility will include no affordable housing units.
- Exploring whether there is a way to create the kind of adjacent public space that could buffer the stark contrast of the design of the facility to the established Lee Heights Shops environment.

Along with neighboring civic associations, DRCA hopes to be an active participant in the Planning Commission's site plan review process for the proposed Kensington facility, which is among the very first site proposals to result from the County's adoption of PLB.

COUNTY PLANS TO INITIATE STUDY OF LOT COVERAGE AND RELATED ZONING ORDINANCE REFORMS Bill Richardson

As described in earlier newsletters and meetings, for many years DRCA has urged the County to reform the generous lot coverage and height limits

reform the generous lot coverage and height limits on residential construction, which have been in place since 2005 and earlier. This year, the County Board agreed to conduct a study of these limits, funded by an additional staff position.

So far, this study has been supported by 14 civic associations, the Forestry and Natural Resources Commission, and the Arlington Tree Action Group. Along with others, DRCA met in July with the County Manager and his planning staff, and with County Board members, to emphasize the importance of prompt action in starting and completing this study -- before the accelerated rate of teardowns imposes further irreparable damage to mature trees, stormwater management, climate change initiatives, and neighboring residents' quiet enjoyment of their homes and access to solar energy.

We plan to continue these regular meetings, at which we have offered details on specific problems with the current generous limits and how those limits might be reformed. We have also tried to ensure the opportunity for meaningful civic association and other public participation in the scoping and conduct of the planned study. Among other things, we have pointed out that the County properly recognized in the missing middle proceedings that the limits should apply to both single-family and multi-family homes, since both pose the same problems created by teardowns.

The Arlington County Civic Federation has also taken a renewed interest in these issues. This year, its Zoning and Planning Committee, now cochaired by two former members of the Planning Commission, has created a subcommittee designed to get additional input on lot coverage, height, and setback limits. DRCA will be an active participant in that subcommittee's work, and we are also reaching out to other civic associations for their input.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CIP) FUNDS LORCOM/VACATION INTERSECTION SAFETY MEASURES Bill Richardson

As part of the School Slow Zone for Dorothy Hamm Middle School, the County previously reduced the speed limit for the nearby segment of Lorcom Lane. In a further measure to address the concerns of DRCA residents, parents, and the Hamm MS principal, the July 2024 CIP approved by the County Board also now devotes about \$2.3 million to installation of improvements to the Lorcom/Vacation Lanes intersection. These will be designed to reduce safety risks associated with the volume of high-speed traffic there.

In October 2022, DRCA requested from staff a traffic study of the problem residents had identified at this intersection. We noted their suggestions of a number of different possible solutions, including stop sign warrants, or HAWK or other signal help. While the new CIP funding would be sufficient to install a new traffic signal if needed, the County's project team will seek public comment on the preferred solution, after its initial scoping and conceptual design work. Staff has found that federal warrants are not met to support an all-way stop, and they do not recommend such an approach given what they say is poor compliance with unwarranted stop signs.

supporting their life cycle. For wildlife, suburbia can be a tough home. The good news: how you care for your yard makes a HUGE difference. Fall is an ideal time to plant. Here are some faves:

Oaks: Sadly, we've had a die-off across the Eastern U.S. and lost many giants. Oaks support more vital species than any other tree, so plant a native one.

Native shrubs: buttonbush, bayberry, inkberry, winterberry, spicebush, sumac, and Virginia sweetspire

Native Perennials: Virginia bluebells, artemisia, milkweed, butterfly weed, baptisia (false indigo), Joe Pye weed (not weeds at all!), native asters, goldenrod

Native grasses: little bluestem, switchgrass, muhly grass, and carex rosea
